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MORE GREEN ALONG THE GREENWAY

You can't miss it: The newest acquisition of land by the Bourne Conservation Trust (BCT). It's near one of the approach routes to our Village, at the corner of Scraggy Neck Road Ext. and County Road. The lot is one acre in size with lots of frontage on these two roads, and it was a buildable lot. Not any more. This parcel will be preserved as open space, enhancing this well-used entrance to our Village and an important route to and from a favorite Cataumet destination: Somerset Creamery.

This new lot, the Shultz Family lot, compliments Cobb Corner, a BCT property across the street, on



the corner of County and Scraggy Neck Roads. Cobb Corner, with the small stream and quiet place to sit, was a gift to the BCT from Sue Cobb, a long-time former resident, known for her colorful summer garden of gladiolas.

Think of the new lot. It has been cleared of underbrush and vines and will now be maintained with meadow grasses and wildflowers. There will be no house built on this land, no driveway, no two-car garage. Birds will be able to nest there. Foxes can pass through it as they travel around town. Squirrels, rabbits and turkeys,



maybe a mole or mouse, will be able to romp and play, perhaps hide from a fox. There may not be a walking trail or a grand vista, and it may not be big, but this land now belongs to all of us and will remain a natural and pastoral habitat.

We must remember that the BCT was founded with private donations, and continues to be supported privately, through financial donations and the dedication of the staff of volunteers

who help maintain the beauty, serenity and convenient access to all BCT properties.

Some BCT properties have been gifts. Others have been purchased through generous donations from people who value and appreciate the extraordinary depth and variety of BCT properties and the protection they have given us all from unwanted development.

In this case, after a long pursuit, the BCT was able to purchase this special corner lot. The price was

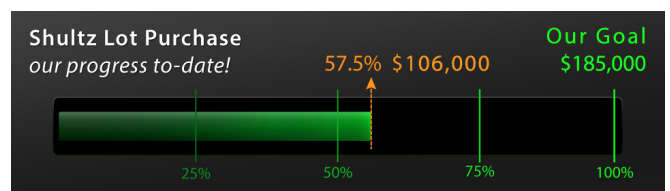

\$170,000. The purchase was completed with a \$10,000 down payment and a \$160,000 loan, a loan that is due to be paid off by the end of this year (2016). Additional costs for clearing and maintaining the lot, closing costs and loan interest are expected to be \$15,000. Bottom line: The BCT needs your help.

There is good news. An anonymous donor has kicked off our fundraising with a generous gift of \$85,000. Our challenge is to match that amount and add \$15,000; in other words, the BCT needs to raise \$100,000 by December 31 to repay the loan and cover costs of this purchase.

NEW DESIGN

We received so much positive response from the Donor booklet we published earlier this year that we decided to update the newsletter format to complement it, and number 50 seemed like the appropriate place to start. With this issue, you will see a cleaner, more contemporary design approach, one which we hope you'll enjoy.

In early 2017, the BCT will send out a complete list of all donors, including those who made memorial and celebration donations, during 2016. We adopted this new approach last year and think it worked well. As always, we send big thanks to all of you who donated your time and/or money to the BCT.



Cape Cod Road Runners "Winter Fun Run"

The 37th running of the Winter Fun Run, sponsored by Cape Cod Road Runners and open to all, will be held on January 8, 2017. This race is a great way to get in shape for the new year, while supporting the BCT. There are awards for several age groups, from juniors under age 20 to seniors age 70 and older. For the race held last January, 169 people completed the course, including ten age 70

and older; the winner was Mike Norton with a time of 29:00. The reward for participating: clam fritters, seafood chowder, water, plus a pair of cotton running gloves. There is a cash bar all afternoon following the race. The race starts and ends at the Weary Travelers Club, 77 Valley Bars Rd., Monument Beach. The course is 4.9 miles, on paved and somewhat hilly roads. Start

time is 10:30 am...rain, snow or shine. The fee is \$16 for pre-registration; \$20 if you register on race day, by 10:00 am. All proceeds from the run are donated to the BCT to help in its efforts to purchase land for conservation and recreation. The BCT sends a big thanks to the Weary Travelers Club and Cape Cod Road Runners for their ongoing support.

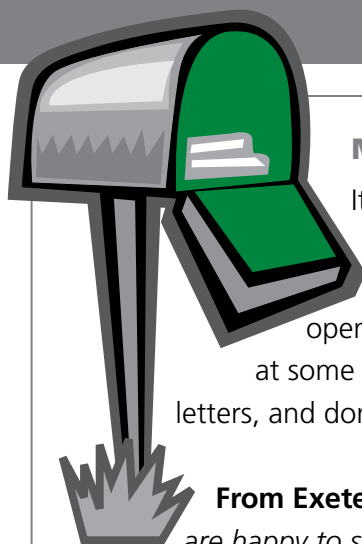
STAY IN TOUCH

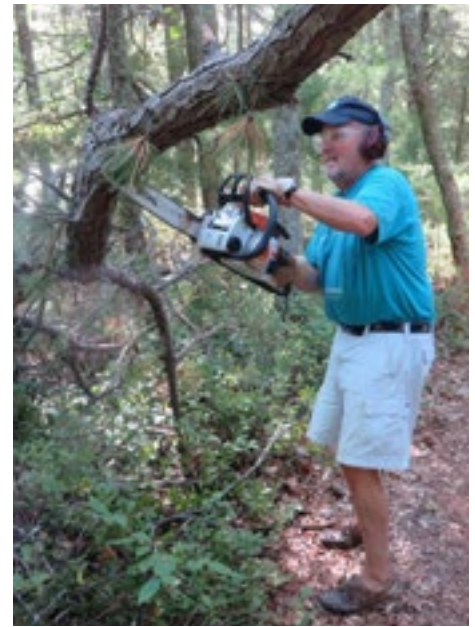
Whatever the Season

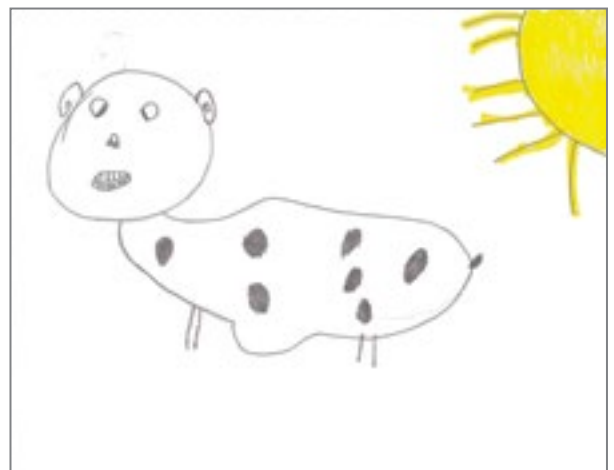
Winners will be announced in the BCT Donor List that will be sent out early next year.

GIVE TO THE BCT!

Your Ongoing Financial Support Is Key to Our Success (and gets you a tax deduction)

Cash donations large and small help maintain the BCT's 501(c)(3) status and grow our general fund. This money enables the BCT to act quickly on new property purchases and funds the general maintenance of all properties. It is also used to hire professional help, for example legal services, when needed. These costs can be significant.

Our fundraising efforts are based on a soft-sell approach, with this newsletter the most important tool.

Donations of any dollar amount are important, because the number of donors shows foundations and other large donors the degree of local support and helps us to retain our status as an IRS 501(c)(3) organization.

This status allows your donation to be tax deductible. In other words, please contribute what you can, as often as you can.

IMPORTANT: The BCT has decided not to list donations, including memorial donations, in this fall edition of its newsletter. Early next year, the BCT will send out a complete list of all those who made donations to the BCT in 2016.

Other Ways of Giving

In addition to cash donations, there are many ways of giving to the BCT:

- Name the BCT in your will or as beneficiary of a life insurance policy.
- Give appreciated securities.
- Contact your bank or financial institution to automatically send a monthly donation to the BCT from a checking or savings account.
- Give the gift of real estate (or sell it to the BCT for less than its fair market value; the difference is considered a charitable gift). Note: A gift of land is a win-win for donors, the BCT and residents of Bourne. Such gifts provide tax advantages and help preserve the scenic character of our area, maintain air quality and provide a natural habitat for local wildlife.
- Offer a matching gift to support our efforts to purchase property. People respond generously when they know their gift will be doubled.

It Works

The BCT approach to fundraising works because our preserved woodlands, shore frontages, marshes and walking trails speak for themselves, and because we are surrounded and supported by people who understand the value and importance of open space, know what our Town might be like without it, and understand that it is everyone's responsibility to protect and maintain it.
